Lacerations and other acute wounds are an important subset of acute injuries with approximately 9 million seen yearly in US Emergency Departments alone (20). These wounds require appropriate physical evaluation for extent of injury, radiographic evaluation for secondary injury, and irrigation/exploration for cleansing and foreign body and debris removal.

There are many types of wounds that can damage the skin including abrasions, lacerations, rupture injuries, punctures, and penetrating wounds. Many wounds are superficial requiring local first aid including cleansing and dressing.

Wound Care: Antibiotics, Treatment & Healing Time

Cleanse the wound periphery with soap and sterile water or available solutions, and provide anesthetics and analgesia whenever possible. Irrigate wounds with saline solution using a large bore needle and syringe. If unavailable, bottled water is acceptable. Leave contaminated wounds, bites, and punctures open.

Patients seeking Emergency Department treatment for wounds are generally concerned about comesis, infection control, and pain management. Each of these issues needs to be addressed. It is important that ED providers choose the appropriate method of wound closure, taking into account the type of wound, the location, and the risk of infection.

Take Care of Wounds Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and clean water, if possible. Avoid touching the wound with your fingers while treating it (if possible, use disposable, latex gloves). Remove obstructive jewelry and clothing from the injured body part.
